Meeting Talk: Bush Blitz

Bush Blitz is Australia's largest nature discovery program. Around three-quarters of Australia's biodiversity is still waiting to be discovered by science. Bush Blitz is a unique cross-sector

partnership that organises expeditions to document plants and animals across Australia.

In this talk, we will hear how Bush Blitz has been discovering new species since 2010, with over 1,700 new species discovered across 41 expeditions, making it the largest program of its type in the world. But Bush Blitz is about more than



just discovering new species, it also engages with land managers, traditional owners, teachers and students. Find out about where Bush Blitz groups have been, including the RV Investigator voyage in WA and NT, and where they are going, over the next few years.

Guest Speaker: Dr Kate Grarock

Kate is the Bush Blitz expedition leader and is responsible for leading teams into the remote locations that are characteristic of a Bush Blitz expedition. Kate is an ecologist, who worked for 5 years on research and restoration of critically endangered grassy woodlands in the ACT, before joining the Bush Blitz team. In her spare time Kate loves hiking and getting outdoors. https://bushblitz.org.au

5 to 6 November: Sarah's Garden: 45 Middleton Cct., Gowrie

Non-natives and new plantings include local indigenous species wherever possible and a 'guerrilla' garden out into the urban 'park' planted with mainly local grassland species.

12 to 13 November: Pillans Garden: 30 Aspen Rise, Jerrabomberra

An entirely native garden which features over 1000 individual species, including more than 70 acacia species and more than 70 grevillea species. A wide range of bird species frequent the garden and the number is increasing as the garden develops. Existing mature eucalypts are complemented by plants sourced from a wide variety of local, regional and far-flung sources, including some not normally grown in the Canberra region. One section of the garden has been developed as a dry 'rainforest' gully using species with glossy, dark green leaves. Owners are ANPSC members.

Seed wanted of local species

The Propagation Group has been asked if we grow local pea species, in particular:

Bossiaea buxifolia and B prostrata; Daviesia leptophylla; Dillwynia phylicoides and D. sp Yetholme; Gompholobium huegelli; Hovea heterophylla; Podolobium procumbens; Pultenaea procumbens and P. microphylla.

Conservation

Myrtle Rust

From the Invasive Species Council web site

'Myrtle rust, an invasive fungal disease, slipped through Australia's biosecurity system in 2010. It impacts many native trees, including certain eucalypts and tea-trees. It causes grey to brown leaf spots on the leaves and buds of trees, is known to severely interfere with tree flowering and fruiting, can kill infected tissue and sometimes leads to death in seedlings and even in some mature trees.'

'The latest science tells us that myrtle rust could send 16 rainforest trees extinct in a generation. This is a fungus that stops key rainforest trees, like native myrtles, turpentines and guavas from growing and reproducing.

And the bad news is the situation is getting worse. Myrtle rust has found its way into the Kimberley in WA.'

ANPSC's October Spring Plant Sale 'Many thanks to all the members and growers who helped with our successful Spring Plant Sale!

Over 6,000 plants were provided by the member growers and ANPSC's propagation group. Thanks to the experience of the helpers (over 30 assisted), the set up on Friday was done at a steady and manageable pace. Thanks also to the people who helped on the early set up on Thursday afternoon and early on Friday. As well as the plants, the signs, marquees, tables and other materials were all ready for the finishing touches on Saturday morning. Due to the pleasant atmosphere, there was time for coffee and chats.

We were happy that Saturday turned out to be warm, sunny and pleasant weather. Over 30 volunteers (including growers) were ready to welcome and help customers. Due to the lower numbers of plants available, there was no early ticketing, and a good crowd was brought in at 8:30am. The first hour was busy, without being rushed and we had almost universally positive comments on the Sale. After the first busy hour, the pace of the rest of the day was more relaxed. The Sale finished by 1pm, and the clean-up was smooth and complete by 2:30pm – again thanks to the good efforts of the supporters.

There were nearly five hundred customer purchases, with only a few hundred of the plants remaining unsold. The income from this Sale makes an important contributor to the financial viability of the Society. More importantly, the Sale is a great contributor to our objectives, and its success is a great showcase for our group.



Report of the DAG October Activity

On Sunday 16 October, the day after the Society's Spring Plant Sale, 18 members of the Daytime Activity Group (DAG) made their way up the long driveway to the home and garden of Alison Roche and Darryl Crapp in Karabar, NSW, there to be greeted by an extensive informal display of chrysocephalums, bulbines and wallaby grass.

Having taken over a large battleaxe block surrounded by many neighbours, Alison and Darryl set about clearing away the existing plantings of exotics while preserving a small stand of the eucalypts typical of the indigenous flora and opening up a fine view of the escarpment to the east of Queanbeyan. Prominent amongst an eclectic array of natives they have planted were a Prostanthera incana (?) in spectacular flower and several rich orange Fabaceae glowing through the understory. Tea and Alison's excellent cake rounded off a very enjoyable visit on a, for once, sunny afternoon. Digby Gascoine

Show and Tell – Flowering now in the Walcott garden. Text by Ros Walcott and photos by Ben Walcott.





Anopterus glandulosus - Native Laurel This plant is an endemic of Tasmania and is limited to rainforest areas. It forms an evergreen shrub, 2-4m high, sometimes a tree to 10m, with 'lily of the valley' flowers. We planted one in July 2014 and it flowered in October 2014, but died in the heat and dryness of January 2016. We have planted another in a pot in March 2021.



Aotus ericoides

We have planted two of these upright spreading shrubs, 0.5-1.5m high x 0.5 - 1.5m wide producing yellow flowers with a red centre, in 2019-2020. The first one died in the heat of December 2019, but the second persists in a pot and the long flowering stems wave attractively in the wind.

Boronias in pots: Boronia anemonifolia

We planted this upright shrub, 0.7mhigh x 0.6mwide, with narrow leaves and many small pink to white flowers in March 2018.

Boronia denticulata

We planted two of these shrubs, 1m high x 1m wide, with bright green aromatic leaves and many showy pink flowers, in 2011 and 2018. The first plant died of heat stress in January 2018, but the second persists, despite the horrors of summer 2020. This species is native to southwestern WA.

Boronia heterophylla red

We planted this upright shrub, 1-2m high x 1-2m wide, with fine bright green aromatic foliage and red bell shaped flowers, in a pot in October 2021. This plant prefers dappled shade and must be protected from frost and hot winds.

Boronia keysii

We planted this rare species of boronia from southeastern Queensland, height to 2m, with aromatic foliage and pink, star-shaped flowers in November 2019. This plant was lost to science for 62 years then rediscovered in 1971.

Boronia 'Lipstick'

We planted this hybrid boronia, *B. crassipes x B. heterophylla*, height 1-2.5m x 50-75cm, an upright, evergreen shrub with narrow, aromatic leaves and many large, purple-pink bell-shaped flowers, in a pot in September 2020.
