

Webinar: Carbon sequestration & biodiversity: valuing & managing carbon-rich systems

Tuesday 13 October, 3:30-5:00 pm AEDT https://climatefirebiodiversity-value.eventbrite.com

International and national climate mitigation policies have seen a growing interest in approaches to carbon accounting and investments in carbon-rich systems. Increasingly this interest includes a focus on the importance of carbon stored in biodiverse systems, as well as the value of integrating biodiversity and other values into new carbon investments.

Speakers will discuss the concept of 'green' and 'blue' carbon accounting in biodiverse systems and explore new approaches to integrating biodiversity, social and cultural values with carbon accounting. They will also examine the impacts of the 2019-20 fire season on Australia's carbon budget, how carbon stocks are impacted by a changing climate, and strategies for ensuring biodiverse carbon sinks are sustainable and resilient to future shocks.

This webinar series is a collaboration between the National Environmental Science Program's Threatened Species Recovery Hub and Earth Systems and Climate Change Hubs.

Show and Tell From Bill Willis' garden

Phebalium sp

A three year old Phebalium nottii (scion) with pink

flowers, on Phebalium squamulosum (flowering rootstock).

The unusual feature of the P. nottii flower arrangement are the yellow stamens which are offset to one side. This is not characteristic of most other members of the genus, (Family: Rutaceae) except for P. woombye.

Flowering occurs in late winter - spring.



Pterostylis curta

- commonly known as the Blunt
Greenhood orchid found in southeastern Australia,
Lord Howe Island and New
Caledonia.
It has a rosette of leaves at its base and a single white and green, forward leaning flower with a brown tip and a twisted labellum.







Calothamnus quadrififolium

A Wander in the Wallum by Linda Tabe

Rod and I managed to be granted permits to squeeze through the Queensland border, just before it was closed a couple of months ago. Since then, we have been taking refuge from the southern winter in our shed home on a one acre block at Cooloola Cove, in SE Queensland. It has been a wonderful wildflower season up here. Here are some pictorial highlights of our local perambulations.





We spotted one of these for the first time, in wet Eucalypt forest; the climbing orchid, Erythrorchis cassythoides, twining and leafless, as the name suggests.

Orchids flowering on our block this year included *Diuris alba* (left), odd when you are used to the yellow versions!

Another was the delightfully named *Arthrochilus irritabilis*, or leafy elbow orchid. The discovery of this one brought the total number of orchid species we have seen on our 1 acre block to 12.







The lovely Eriostemon australasius was particularly prolific this year.







Three more favourites that are putting on a great show are (left to right); *Boronia falcifolia*, which surprisingly, thrives in boggy places, *Daviesia umbellata*, and *Ricinocarpus pinifolius*, which is absolutely resplendent through up the whole area right now.

Asterolasia hexapetala (yellow)

Asterolasia is a small genus of about 5 species, closely related to *Phebalium* and *Leionema*. They are generally small to medium shrubs which grow in sheltered, open forests. All are endemic to Australia and occur in the eastern half of the continent. Most are small shrubs with very aromatic foliage and producing star-like flowers in the white to bright yellow range. A.hexapetala is a small to medium shrub which rarely exceeds 2 metres in height. The leaves are hairy, grey-green in colour and up to 4cm long and 2 cm wide. However, A. hexapetala frequently produces flowers with six petals. A hexapetala has a restricted distribution in the Warrumbungle Ranges in the central west of New South Wales. In cultivation the species performs best in a moist, well drained and slightly sheltered position (but not dense shade). The plants will usually tolerate periods of dryness once established.

Asterolasia asteriscophora – Lemon Starbush Erect shrub, 1-2m high, with yellow flowers. Found in southern NSW and Victoria







Grevillea oleoides

Native to a restricted area of coastal NSW, this is an erect, often suckering shrub to 1.8m high with entire linear leaves about 15cm long. The red flowers are borne in loose spider like heads from winter to early summer.

Boronia coerulescens - Blue Boronia

Erect shrub to 50cm with short thick linear leaves. Flowers vary from bluish to pink and white. Distribution NSW, Vic, SA, WA. Growing well in a pot.



Grevillea rosmarinifolia 'Wright'

The original plant was found by Pat and Warwick Wright on the nature strip near their house, a vigorous plant growing out into the street so in danger of being removed. We grew 4 plants from cuttings which have grown well. They have very dark green leaves with profuse cream and red clusters of flowers over many months



Acacia denticulosa - Sandpaper Wattle

Erect, sparsely branched shrub to 2m high by 3m across. Thickly textured elliptical phyllodes are up to 7cm long, toothed with a rasp like surface. Golden rod shaped flowers to 7cm long in spring. Distribution WA – status vulnerable. Dry situation needed. Rare plant from SW WA, Wongan Hills.

Show and Tell

From the Walcotts - flowering at the ANBG at this time



Anigozanthos manglesii or Red and Green Kangaroo Paw is the floral emblem of Western Australia. This plant is one of the most spectacular of the Kangaroo Paws, with its green flowers and bright red bases on red furry stems. This plant grows along the southern part of the west coast of Western Australia.





Alyogyne 'West Coast Gem' has clear purple 'hibiscus' style flowers which open for a short period only but are prolific. The bush is medium sized with coarse foliage.







Asterolasia 'Lemon Essence' is a compact shrub with masses of lemon yellow star flowers. This plant was developed at the ANBG.
