Meeting Talk: Waterwatch – helping to protect, conserve, restore and manage landscapes.

Waterwatch is a community water quality monitoring program that encourages all Australians to become involved and active in the protection and management of their waterways and catchments. Waterwatch engages and supports local community groups, residents, schools and landowners to regularly monitor the water quality of local creeks, wetlands, lakes, rivers and drainage lines. The program is extensive, covering the Murrumbidgee River and Yass River catchments upstream of Burrinjuck Dam - an area of more than 11,000km2.

Each year, Waterwatch coordinates hundreds of citizen scientists to record data on water quality and aquatic ecosystems. Their records are so precise and detailed that they form part of the Territory's official water quality monitoring scheme and contribute to the development of the ACT's catchment management policy. Waterwatch data has also helped to inform community-based conservation activities such as creek restoration, willow removal, weed eradication, habitat development and reduced use of pesticides and fertilisers.

Guest Speaker: Woo O'Reilly

Woo O'Reilly has 20 years' experience in the field of freshwater management ranging from research on montane stream frogs, Ramsar wetland and migratory bird conservation, as well as broader catchment management. Her most recent work involves engaging the community in catchment health through her work as the Regional Facilitator of Upper Murrumbidgee Waterwatch.

Open Gardens Canberra

22 to 23 October: Vasey Garden: 46 Vasey Cr., Campbell Over 500 species of flowering and non-flowering native trees, shrubs and groundcovers. Owners are ANPSC members.

5 to 6 November: Sarah's Garden: 45 Middleton Cct., Gowrie

Non-natives and new plantings include local indigenous species wherever possible and a 'guerrilla' garden out into the urban 'park' planted with mainly local grassland species.

12 to 13 November: Pillans Garden: 30 Aspen Rise, Jerrabomberra

An entirely native garden which features over 1000 individual species, including more than 70 acacia species and more than 70 grevillea species. A wide range of bird species frequent the garden and the number is increasing as the garden develops. Existing mature eucalypts are complemented by plants sourced from a wide variety of local, regional and far-flung sources, including some not normally grown in the Canberra region. One section of the garden has been developed as a dry 'rainforest' gully using species with glossy, dark green leaves. Owners are ANPSC members.

STEP

The **Southern Tablelands Ecosystems Park (STEP)** is a regional botanic garden, education and conservation centre demonstrating southern tablelands species within the **National Arboretum**.

STEP advises that their site, Forest 20, has been reopened to the public following remediation to paths and locations caused by storm damage and encourages people to visit and enjoy what's in flower.

Conservation

Update on the Lawson North Residential Development

The Conservation Council ACT Region recently made a submission to the Minister for Environment and Water regarding the Lawson North EPBC Referral.

ANPSC is a member of the Conservation Council and has given its support in opposing this development.

Defence Housing Australia, a Commonwealth Government agency, put forward the proposal to develop the Lawson Grasslands for housing which would lead to the loss of approximately 15.8 hectares of critically endangered ecological communities under Commonwealth environment laws.

In addition, the ACT Government has also called on the Federal Environment Minister to reject the proposal to develop the Lawson Grasslands. Refer to:

Reminder: No collecting of plant material from NSW National Parks and Nature Reserves

'There has been a tightening up of regulations concerning the collection of plant and animal material from NSW National Parks and Nature Reserves that affects not just threatened species but all plants however common. ANPSC members are advised that they should not collect any plant material without a permit in such areas. Our Society's reputation and good relationship with the local NP&WS and the Threatened Species Unit of NSW Department of Environment could be seriously compromised by such activities. Suitable plant material for propagation is easily available outside the reserves in State Forests, Crown Lands, TSR's, private land and along roadsides where permits are not required, except for threatened species that are protected everywhere.

For further information see National Parks and Wildlife Regulation 2019 Heading 21 on the NSW Government website that states:

21 Protection of vegetation

- (1) A person must not —
- (a) gather, pluck, pull up, poison, take, dig up, cut, fell, remove, damage or destroy any vegetation in a park, or (b) have any vegetation in the person's possession in a park, whether for removal or otherwise, or (c) introduce any vegetation into a park.'

Eucalypt Australia 2023 Dahl Fellowships – Myrtle rust project

Eucalypt Australia has awarded a Fellowship, to Alyssa Martino, funding a project to monitor the spread of myrtle rust on Eucalyptus and other Myrtaceae across Australia.

This project will focus on building a network of 'Eucalyptus and Myrtaceae Protectors'. By providing the necessary resources to educate people of the symptoms of myrtle rust, this will allow citizens to identify and report myrtle rust in the natural environment.

Report of the DAGs September South Coast visit

Over the 3 days, the Day Activity Group visited: Burrewarra Point Reserve, Guerilla Bay with its diversity of vegetation types and the wildlife this vegetation supports, as well as the aesthetic scenic values; Eurobadalla Regional Botanic Gardens; the Broulee Bangalay Sand Forest, a threatened ecological community associated with coastal sand plains found in the Sydney Basin and South East Corner bioregions; and Horse Island near Bodalla with its beautiful garden and home located on Tuross Lake. This 80 hectare garden is a showcase of native Australian plants used in a formal and informal setting.

Acacia 'Bilby Blue' We planted one of these shrubs, 3m x 3m, with grey green foliage and bright yellow ball flowers in April 2017.



Acacia cardiophylla

West Wyalong Wattle, 3-4m high, began as the most reliable of our wattles, with attractive feathery foliage and masses of bright yellow ball flowers in the spring. We planted 12 of these fast growing, tough plants in many different positions in the garden in 2003 and 2006, but they are a little frost sensitive in Canberra. We now have one remaining plant which was planted in February 2020. This plant is native to central and southern NSW.



Acacia gracilifolia – Graceful Wattle

We planted one of these slender upright shrubs, to 2m high, with very fine phyllodes and gold ball flowers in October 2011. This plant developed scale and we removed it in November 2014. We planted another specimen in November 2019 and this one persists. This plant is native to Flinders Ranges, Mt. Lofty Ranges and Port Pirie, South Australia.

Acacia gittinsii

We planted this shrub, 2-4m high x 1-2m wide, with globular flower heads and fine green phyllodes, in October 2019. This plant is native to the Blackdown Tableland, central highlands area, Queensland.







Acacia 'Twilight Glow'

We planted this hybrid A. howittii x leprosa seedling, 4-5m high x 2-3m wide, with rich green foliage and mustard pink ball flowers with yellow stamens, in August 2019. This plant was eaten to the ground by kangaroos December 2019 and was looking poorly. We removed the original plant for failure to thrive 2/22. We purchased another specimen to plant along the right hand boundary in July 2021 and are rewarded with our first flowers in September 2022.

Acacia leprosa 'Scarlet Blaze' – Cinnamon Wattle

We planted six 'Scarlet Blaze', a small evergreen tree, height 4-5m, fast growing, with a semi weeping habit, from 2005-2014, but only one remains. Commonly known as Cinnamon Wattle because leaves crushed in warm weather release a cinnamon like fragrance. The red flowers are spectacular and showy. A single specimen with red flowers was found in Victoria, but does not now exist in the wild. We find in our garden that these plants must be protected from the wind, as they are quite brittle.
