Meeting Talk: Eremophilas in the Landscape - three field trips hunting Emu Bush in western Queensland.

Lyndal Thorburn will recount the experiences of herself and husband Tom Jordan hunting Eremophila in the wild in western Queensland over three field trips during which they drove over 10,000km. They went from not being able to find anything, to being able to spot an emu bush speeding past at 100km/hour. The trips greatly enhanced their understanding of what wild landscapes offer to plants in the Eremophila genus, and they are now better able to understand this genus' responses in domestic garden situations. Lyndal will illustrate her talk with photos of the 17 species they were hunting, and the occasional dinosaur.

Guest Speaker: Lyndal Thorburn

Lyndal is a life member of ANPS Canberra, a member of APS NSW South East Region group, and has been leader of the Eremophila Study Group since 2015. A scientist by training but not by profession, she has kept her interest in biology alive through long term involvement with the APS Canberra propagation group, membership of ANPSA Study Groups, and participation in many Citizen Science groups including inaturalist, NatureMapr and Frog ID. Shortly after moving to Canberra, Lyndal was asked by Canberra Ornithologists' Group to join the Management Committee for Barren Grounds Nature Reserve, which at the time was being established as an education centre. She held this position for several years. She has since also been involved in the Queanbeyan River Corridor Management Committee and Queanbeyan Landcare. She and Tom now own a property on the South Coast and are enthusiastically focussed on regeneration of its local flora. Lyndal's interest in Eremophila (Emu Bush) was kindled in 1985 when they first bought a pink Eremophila maculata 'Wendy' - a plant which is still alive in their Queanbeyan garden. She and Tom have since grown over 100 varieties in their rather shady garden, and they have been delighted to discover that many in the genus are frost hardy and don't need sun all day. This garden is also the source of many Eremophilas that have been sold over the years at ANPS Canberra plant sales.

DAG October Activity

Tuesday 3 October, 10.30am Visit Jo Walker's garden, 'Parraweena', 159 Poppet Road, Wamboin.

Lunch following at Sutton Bakery.

Jo's property, Parraweena, is a 20-acre bush block on the lower slopes of Poppet Hill. The vegetation ranges from areas of dry forest through understorey shrubs to open grassy areas containing heaths, daisies and forbs. There is a small area of garden along the driveway and at the side of the house – plus many plantings around the large dam and amongst the original vegetation.

How to get there: Drive along Sutton Road from the south (via Queanbeyan or Pialligo Avenue). Just after the NSW/ACT border sign, turn right into Norton Road. Pass Cooper Road (on right). Turn next right onto Poppet Road (with small white church on the corner). Turn left at letterboxes 159-165 onto dirt track. The gate is on the left of the electricity pole at the top of the track.

'This morning, 19 September, nine DAGs members had a very enjoyable visit to the garden of Fiona Matthews in Burra. After Fiona led us through the garden areas closest to the house, we wandered through some of the natural native vegetation, and finished with a picnic lunch and then delicious cake Fiona had very generously baked for us.

Fiona became custodian of this property in 1999. It is a 40acre bush block with mostly Eucalyptus mannifera and E. rossii, Rytidosperma pallidum (Red anther Wallaby Grass) and Acacia paradoxa and some tea tree. The earth is rocky with shale and not a lot of soil.

Fiona has created a more wild and natural garden using native plants. There are many fascinating repurposed and recycled items as garden sculpture that are (mostly) immune to the attack of local wildlife.

The garden blends into the native bush and many seats take advantage of the different aspects, to chase the sun or shade depending on the season and to contemplate and appreciate the quiet hum of nature.'

Grevillea anethifolia

Our original plant of Grevillea anethifolia was given to us by Neil Marriott in 2014 and has proved very attractive in the garden. This plant is not endangered in the wild in WA and SA, but much of its natural habitat in NSW has been cleared. This plant suckers freely and supplies plenty of new plants for sharing. The foliage is dense and intricate, light green and the white flowers are prolific in spring. This plant should be cut back after flowering and will reward you with new growth.



Acacia floribunda 'Little Flori'

We have planted two of these mounding shrubs, 60cm x 1m wide. with green feathery leaves and bright yellow flowers in 2019 and 2020.





Grevillea 'Crimson Villea'

We planted this compact grevillea with masses of showy crimson winter flowers, 80cm x 80cm, in February 2020. This cultivar of G. rosmarinifolia had its first flowers in September.




Rhodanthe anthemoides 'Paper Cascade', 'Paper Star', 'Southern Stars', 'Starshower' and 'Sunray Snow'

We have planted more than 60 of these perennial everlasting daisies, 0.3 m high x 1m wide, with aromatic grey leaves and white papery flowers in summer, often pink in bud, from 2004 onward. These sub-alpine plants prefer a well-drained, mulched sunny position, but thrive with some overhead protection in our garden. Slugs love them – put down slug deterrent.

Grevillea lanigera 'Celia'

We planted three of these low hardy shrubs, 45cm high x 1m wide, with pink and white flowers, in 2018. This plant needs full sun and is frost hardy, and the flowers attract birds.



Previously Phebalium frondosum. We planted this erect shrub, 1.5-3m high x 1-1.5m wide, with very dark green fragrant foliage and white flowers, in September 2023. This plant grows best in full sun or part shade in well drained acidic soils and is frost and snow tolerant. Threatened species.
